






Co-Hosts of the June 2021 UArctic Assembly Meeting in Portland, Maine




Portland is home to Eimskip U.S.A., Iceland's largest cargo shipping company, connecting Maine and New England to the Arctic region.

Portland


- Native Americans, originally called the Portland peninsula *Machigonne* ("Great Neck").
- Portland was named for Isle of Portland, off the coast of Dorset, England, and the city of Portland, Oregon, was in turn named for Portland, Maine.
- Weather in June
 - Avg. High: 73.3 °F, 22.9 °C
 - Avg. Low: 53.6 °F, 12.0 °C
 - Avg. Precipitation: 3.79 inches, 3.79 mm

Portland Lighthouse. Portland is the quintessential New England town for its rocky cliffs, 19th century architecture, and lighthouses overlooking the Atlantic Ocean.



Portland

- Situated on a peninsula in Casco Bay on the Gulf of Maine and the Atlantic Ocean
- Incorporated on July 4, 1786
- Most populous city in Maine with a population of 66,417 in 2018
- Total area of 70 square miles (180 km²), of which 21 square miles (55 km²) is land and 48 square miles (125 km²) is water.
- Portland's economy relies mostly on the service sector and tourism.
- Marine industry still plays an important role in the city's economy, with an active waterfront that supports fishing and commercial shipping.




Wabanaki Nations of New England

The Wabanaki Nations – **Abenaki, Maliseet, Mi'kmaq, Passamaquoddy, and Penobscot** – are thriving and growing in Maine and beyond.

Over 10,000 Native people currently live in Maine. Most are Wabanaki – a confederacy of Nations that today consists of the four federally recognized tribes in Maine: Penobscot, Passamaquoddy, Micmac, and Maliseet.

In addition, the Wabanaki includes several bands of the Abenaki tribe, located primarily in New Hampshire, Vermont, and Quebec, Canada



Hotel Accommodations



PWM, BGR, and MHT do not currently have regularly scheduled direct international flights to or from these airports.

Typically, travelers book international flights to/from the airports with one stop in a major regional airport prior to leaving or coming into the United States.

Confirmed Venues for UArctic Assembly Core Meetings

June 1, 2022 - University of Southern Maine

- 5 minutes from downtown Portland via bus, taxi, and Uber
- 15 minutes walk from downtown Portland
- Hannaford Hall: +500-seat auditorium; reception area; 6 breakout rooms accommodating 40-60 people



June 2-3, 2022 - University of New England, Portland Campus

- 10 minutes from downtown Portland via bus, taxi, Uber
- Innovation Hall: Modern conference center renovated in 2017; 600 max main hall; connected to large reception center; breakout rooms holding 50-150 persons.

Portland Museum of the Art

- The largest and oldest public art institution in the U.S. state of Maine. Founded as the Portland Society of Art in 1882.
- Located in the downtown area known as The Arts District in Portland
- Can accommodate 200+ people for a reception
- Walking distance to all hotels




Potential Lobster Dinner on Peaks Island on the Second Evening June 2, 2022

Peaks Island is the most populous island in Casco Bay, Maine (pop ~ 900 in 2017 though the population of residents increases in the summer by an estimated 2,000–4,000).

It is part of the city of Portland and is approximately 3 miles (4.8 km) from downtown. The island is served by Casco Bay Lines and is home to its own elementary school, library, and police station.

While small, the island hosts a variety of businesses including an ice cream parlor, restaurant, grocery store, kayak rentals, golf cart rentals, art galleries, the Fifth Maine Regiment Museum and the Umbrella Cover Museum, among others.
