Advancing Sustainable Municipal Solid Waste Management in the Arctic

The Arctic's fragile environment, severe weather conditions, and rapidly changing climate, make improving municipal solid waste management (MSWM) here critical.

A comparative case study of three communities revealed five categories of enablers and barriers that affect the advancement of MSWM.



Analysis

Evolutionary Governance Theory exposes dependencies that create further enablers and barriers including:

> Path Dependencies:

Either enable innovations or create barriers for local waste policies

> Interdependencies:

Enable advancement of MSWM when there is local leadership commitment

> Goal Dependencies:

Create barriers to advancing MSWM when there is a lack of overarching goals

LANDFILL CAPACITY

- Diversion from landfills and incineration
- Running out of space
- No new landfill sites
- Unauthorized landfill

WEATHER & LOCATION

- Waste collection innovations
- Challenges with waste collection in winter
- Issues with access to markets for recyclables

LEGISLATION

- Presence of legislation that mandates recycling
- Absence of legislation that mandates recycling

FUNDING

- Presence of national funding for MSWM infrastructure
- Absence of national funding for MSWM infrastructure

PRIORITIES

- Continuity of policies under newly elected local leadership
- Disruption of policies under newly elected local leadership

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
